Summer Exchange in Nantes

Last year Richard Shieldhouse, a friend who lives in Jacksonville, Florida, and member of that city's Sister City Association, told me about a French language immersion course being offered by the Université Permanente de l'Université de Nantes and la Maison des États-Unis in Nantes. The course offered six days of French classes, three hours each morning, followed by lunch, with cultural visits and sightseeing tours every afternoon. The cost for the classes and lunch was 250 euros. As if that wasn't enough, free accommodation and meals would be provided by members of la Maison for up to two weeks, to allow time to visit historic and cultural sites in the area. The stated goal of the program was to learn or improve our French language skills and to discover French culture.

How could I miss out on such an amazing opportunity? I immediately began planning for my trip to Nantes. I was matched with my host, Arlette Mesnard, a charming and energetic woman with a house in Nantes, and a beach house on Noirmoutier Island, southwest of Nantes on the Atlantic coast. L'Université Permanente de l'Université de Nantes is located on the Île de Nantes adjacent to the site of les Machines de l'île, an artistic and cultural project created to promote the city's image and build its identity "as a creative metropolis of dream and of fantasy." I was fascinated by the huge mechanical elephant that passed by the restaurant as we ate lunch, trumpeting and spraying water from its trunk to the delight of nearby children.

Many activities were planned for all of us in the afternoons after our morning French class and during the week following our courses. We toured Nantes, visiting the Nantes Cathédrale, the Place Royale, Passage Pommeraye, and other interesting locations. We were welcomed to Nantes at the Hôtel de Ville (city hall) by local and visiting dignitaries where was a Breton musical group, hors d'oeuvres, and wine. We visited the 13th century Château des Ducs de Bretagne, where an American Independence Day celebration was held for us, complete with a short speech, an excellent R&B band, hors d'oeuvres, and drinks. It was truly wonderful. We were treated to traditional Breton galettes on the Bateau-lavoir restaurant on the banks of the Erdre, and later to a cruise on the river.



Continuation of "Summer Exchange in Nantes"

We were welcomed by Christophe de Goulaine at the Château de Goulaine, a castle in the Loire Valley and home to the Marquis de Goulaine family for over a thousand years. It was Christophe's father, Marquis Robert de Goulaine, who originally established the *jumelage* between Jacksonville and Nantes in recognition of his family's relationship with Northeast Florida that extends to the 16th century. His ancestor, René Goulaine de Laudonnière, was a key participant in an ill-fated French attempt to colonize modern-day Florida. We also visited the medieval walled town of Guérande, Les Marais Salants (salt marshes), and the ancient Breton city of Brière with its charming thatch-roofed cottages.

There were trips to Mont-Saint-Michel in Normandy, to Saint-Nazaire, a major marine base for the Nazis during WWII, and to the historic walled port city of Saint-Malo in Brittany, once notorious for privateering and almost totally destroyed by American shelling and bombing as well as British naval gunfire in WWII. We visited the beautiful town of Dinard on the Côte d'Émeraude of Brittany and the ancient medieval town of Dinan.

This was my fifth trip to France and all have been enjoyable, but this was the best of them all because we were treated like visiting dignitaries by the Nantais officials and honored like guests by our hosts. I was amazed by the warmth and generosity I experienced everywhere I went. Mariette Cassouret, head of la Maison des États-Unis, was a force of nature, helping and guiding us at school and on our tours. It was clear that a great deal of planning went into creating this wonderful combination of learning and adventure, and I am very grateful to have been one of the fortunate recipients. I hope to return to Nantes and the west coast of France again.
